APPENDIX A	

A. SCOPE

This cash and investment management policy applies to all moneys and other financial resources available for investment by the Town of Beekman. The Town Board will annually review this policy.

B. OBJECTIVES

The primary objective of the town's cash and investment activities are, in priority order,

- To conform with all applicable federal, state and other legal requirements (legal);
- To adequately safeguard principal (safely);
- To provide sufficient liquidity to meet all operating requirements (liquidity);
- To obtain a reasonable rate of return (yield)

C. DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY

The governing boards' responsibility for administration of the investment program is delegated to the Town Supervisor who, with the assistance of the Town's Finance office, shall establish written procedures for the management of the cash and investment program consistent with these guidelines. Such procedures shall include an adequate internal control structure to provide satisfactory level of accountability based on a database or records incorporation description and amounts of cash deposits and investments, transaction dates, and other relevant information and regulate the activities of subordinate employees.

D. PRUDENCE

- 1. All participants in the cash and investment process shall seek to act responsibly as custodians of the public trust and shall avoid any transaction that might impair public confidence in the Town of Beekman to govern effectively.
- 2. Deposits and Investments shall be made with judgment and care, under circumstances then prevailing, which persons of prudence discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the safety of the principal, as well as, the probable income to be derived.
- All participants involved in the cash and investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that could conflict with proper execution of the investment program, or which could impair their ability to make impartial investment decisions.

E. DIVERSIFICATION

It is the policy of the Town Of Beekman to diversify its deposits and investments by financial institution, by investment instrument, and my maturity scheduling.

F. INTERNAL CONTROLS

- 1. It is the policy of the Town of Beekman for all monies collected by an officer or employee of the government to transfer those funds to the Town Supervisor within 5 days of deposit, or within the time period specified in law, whichever is shorter.
- 2. The Town Supervisor with the assistance of the Town Finance Office is responsible for establishing and maintaining and internal control structure to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that deposits and investments are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or deposition, that transactions are executed in accordance with managements authorization and recorded properly, and are managed in compliance with applicable laws and regulation.

G. DESIGNATION OF DEPOSITORIES

The banks and trust companies authorized in the State of New York for the deposit of monies up to the maximum amounts are as follows:

H. COLLATERALIZING OF DEPOSITS

In accordance with the provisions of General Municipal Law #10, all deposits of the Town of Beekman, including certificates of deposit and special time deposits. In excess of the amount insured under the provisions of the Federal Deposit Insurance Act shall be secured:

- By a pledge of "eligible securities" with an aggregate "market value" as provide by GML #10 equal to the aggregate amount of deposits from the categories designated in Appendix A to the policy.
- 2. By an eligible "irrevocable letter of credit" Issued by a qualified bank other than the bank with the deposits in favor of the government for a term not to exceed 90 days with an aggregate value equal to 140% of the aggregate amount of deposits and the agreed upon interest, if any. A qualified bank is one whose commercial paper and other unsecured short term debt obligations are rated in one of the three highest rating categories by at least one nationally recognized statistical rating organization or by a bank that is in compliance with applicable federal minimum risk based capital requirements.
- 3. By an eligible surety bond payable to the government for an amount at least equal to 100% of the aggregate amount of deposits and the agreed upon interest, if any, executed by an insurance company authorized to do business in New York State, whose claims paying ability is rated in the highest rating category by at least tow nationally recognized statistical rating organizations.

I. SAFEKEEPING AND COLLATERALIZATION

- 1. Eligible securities used for collateralizing deposits shall be held by the depository and or a third party bank or trust company subject to security and custodial agreements.
- 2. The security agreement shall provide that eligible securities are being pledged to secure local government deposits together with agreed upon interest, if any, and any costs or expenses arising out of the collection of such deposits upon default. It shall also provide the conditions under which the securities may be sold, presented for payment, substituted or released and the events which will enable the local government to exercise its rights against the pledged securities. In the event that the securities are not registered or inscribed in the name of the local government, such securities shall be delivered in a form suitable for transfer for with an assignment in blank to the Town of Beekman or Custodial bank.
- 3. The custodial agreement shall provide that securities held by the bank or trust company, or agent of the custodian for, the local government, will be kept separate and apart form the general assets of the custodial bank or trust company and will not, in any circumstances, be commingled with or become part of the backing for any other deposit or other liabilities. The agreement should also describe that the custodial shall confirm the receipt, substitution or release of the securities, the agreement shall provide for the frequency of the revaluation of eligible securities and for the substitution of securities when a change in the rating of a security may cause ineligibility. Such agreement shall include all provisions necessary to provide the local government a perfected interest in securities.

J. PERMITTED INVESTMENTS

As authorized by GML sec. 11, the Town Of Beekman authorizes the Town Supervisor to invest moneys not required for immediate expenditure for terms not to exceed its projected cash flow needs in the following types of investments:

- Special time deposit accounts
- Certificates of deposit
- Obligations of the United State of America
- Obligations guaranteed by agencies of the United States of America where the payment of principal and interest are guaranteed by the United States of America
- Obligations of the State of New York
- Obligations issued pursuant to LFL sec. 24 or 25 (with approval of the State Comptroller) by a municipality, school district or district corporation other than the Town of Beekman
- Obligations of public authorities, public housing authorities, urban renewal agencies and industrial development agencies where the general State statues' governing such entities or whose specific enabling legislation authorizes such investments.
- Certificates of Participation (COPS) issued pursuant to GML, section 109-b,
- Obligations of this local government, but only with any moneys, in a reserve fund established pursuant to GML, section 6-c, 6-d, 6-e, 6-g, 6-h, 6-j, 6-k, 6-l, 6-m, or 6-n.

J. PERMITTED INVESTMENTS (cont'd)

- NY CLASS
- Cooperative Investments provided the legality and safety, and liquidity of all monies invested is on a cooperative basis documented with review by Legal Counsel and agreement approved by the Town Board.

All investments obligations shall be payable or redeemable at the option of the Town of Beekman within such times as the proceeds will be needed to meet expenditures for purposes for which the moneys were provided and, in the case of obligations purchased with the proceeds of bonds or notes, shall be payable or redeemable at the option of the Town of Beekman within two years of the date of purchase.

K. AUTHORIZED FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS AND DEALERS

The Town Of Beekman shall maintain a list of financial institutions and dealers approved for investment purposes and establish appropriate limits to the amount of investments which can be made with each financial institution or dealer. All financial institutions with which the local government conducts business must be credit worth to do business in the State of New York. Banks shall provide their most recent Consolidated Report of the condition (Call report) at the request of the Town of Beekman.

L. PURCHASE OF INVESTMENTS

The Supervisor is authorized to contract for the purchase of investments;

- 1. Directly, including through a repurchase agreement, from an authorized trading partner.
- 2. By participation in a cooperative investment program (CLASS) with another authorized governmental entity pursuant to Article 5G of the GML where such program meets all the requirements set forth in the Office of the State Comptroller Opinion no. 88-46, and the specific program has been authorized by the governing Board.
- 3. By utilizing an ongoing investment program with an authorized trading partner pursuant to a contract authorized by the governing board.

All purchase obligations, unless registered or inscribed in the name of the local government, shall be purchase through, delivered to and held in the custody of a bank or trust company. Such obligations shall be purchased, sold or presented for redemption or payment by such bank or trust company only in accordance with prior written authorization from the officer authorized to make the investment. All such transactions shall be confirmed in writing to the Town of Beekman by the bank or trust company. Any obligation held in custody of a bank or trust company shall be held pursuant to a written custodial agreement as described n GML #10.

The custodial agreement shall provide the securities held by the bank or trust company, as agent of and custodial for, the local government, will be kept separate and apart from the general assets of the custodial bank or trust company and will not, in any circumstances, be commingled with or become part of the backing for any deposit or other liabilities. The agreement shall describe how the custodial shall confirm the receipt and release of the securities. Such agreement shall include all provisions necessary to provide the local government a perfected interest in the securities.

APPENDIX A

M. SCHEDULE OF ELIGIBLE SECURITIES

- Obligations issued, or fully insured or guaranteed as to the payment of principal and interest, by the United States of America, an agency thereof or a United States government sponsored corporation.
- Obligations issued or fully guaranteed by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, the Inter-American Development Bank the Asian Development Bank and the African Development Bank.
- Obligations partially insured or guaranteed by any agency of the United States of America, at a proportion of the Market Value of the obligation that represents the amount of the insurance or guaranty.
- 4 Obligations issued or fully insured or guaranteed by the State of New York, obligations issued by a municipal corporation, school district or district corporation of such State or obligations of any public benefit corporation which under a specific State statute may be accepted as security for deposits of public moneys.
- Obligations issued by states (other than the State of New York) of the United States rated in one of the three highest rating categories by at least one nationally recognized statistical rating organization.
- Obligations of Puerto Rico rated in one of the three highest rating categories by at last one nationally recognized statistical rating organization.
- Obligations of counties, cities and other governmental entities of an state other than the State of New York giving the power to levy taxes that are backed by the full faith and credit of such governmental entity and rated in one of the three highest rating categories by at least one nationally recognized statistical rating organization.
- 8 Obligations of domestic corporations rated n one of the two highest rating categories by at last one nationally recognized statistical rating organization @110% of deposited funds.
- 9 Any mortgage related securities, as defined in the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended, which may be purchased by banks under the limitations established by bank regulatory agencies @ 120% of deposited funds.
- 10 Commercial paper and bankers acceptances issued by a bank, other than the Bank, rated in the highest short term category by at least one nationally recognized statistical rating organization and having maturities of not longer than 60 days from the date they are pledged @110% of deposited funds.
- 11 Zero coupon obligations of the United State government marketed as "Treasury strips" @120% of deposited funds.
- 12 Surety Bonds issued by certain highly-rated insurance companies @100% of deposited funds.
- 13 Letters of Credit with a maturity of less than 90 days issued by certain highly-rated or well capitalized banks at 130% of deposited funds.

STATEMENT DELIVERED DURING THE TOWN OF BEEKMAN'S FEBRUARY 26, 2024, PUBLIC MEETING

The Town's bookkeeper and account clerk are responsible for preparing and submitting for payment all Town payroll. On February 15th they noted numerous deficiencies in, and variations between, the time punches and time sheets submitted by and on behalf of the Town Highway Department (the "Department") employees for the January 28th to February 10th pay period. These deficiencies and variations included the following:

- On January 1st, numerous Highway employees clocked in but failed or refused to clock out.
- Also on January 1st, one employee clocked in at 9:47 AM and clocked out at 11:24 AM, making him the only Highway employee to punch in and out on that date.
- These partial punches of Highway employees were recorded on the Highway Superintendent's biometric time clock, not the Town's official, Paychex time clock (Paychex is the vendor supplying and maintaining the official Town time clock).
- The Highway Superintendent's time sheets, which he calls, "Detail Payroll Reports", indicated that he deleted all the January 1st punches.
- Although marked as deleted, the Detail Payroll Reports also reflect the partial time punches
 of Highway employees, none of which demonstrate that any employees worked 7.5 hours
 on January 1st.
- On the contrary, the punches of the lone employee who punched in and out demonstrate he appeared to work only 96 minutes on January 1st. Despite this, the Highway Superintendent represented in his Detail Payroll Report that all Highway employees worked 7.5 hours.
- The Detail Payroll Reports covering the January 28th to February 10th pay period submitted by the Highway Superintendent reflected an entitlement to 3.5 hours of overtime for each Department employee. While this is certainly possible under Collective Bargaining Agreement between the Town and the Teamsters, the failure or refusal of the employees to properly punch in and out on January 28th, in conjunction with the Highway Superintendent deleting those partial punches and claiming each employee worked an identical 7.5 hours without providing any contemporaneous backup, prevents the Town from verifying the call-in hours actually worked.
- Further, the Detail Payroll Reports submitted by the Highway Superintendent for two employees covering this pay period were neither signed nor certified by the Superintendent, including, of course, any hours allegedly worked on January 28th.

On February 15th, immediately after receiving an email from the Superintendent claiming that overtime wages had not been paid, the Town's bookkeeper and account clerk each reviewed their payroll transcription and preparation. They each independently confirmed that there were no errors in om these.

The Town bookkeeper then contacted Paychex, which is the vendor supplying and maintaining the official TOB time clock. Paychex confirmed in writing that same day that there were no missing time punches for Highway employees during the January 28th to February 10th pay period due to equipment failure. The Town followed up with Paychex that day seeking broader verification of the proper functioning of the Town time clock during this pay period. Later that same day, the vendor "verified that the time clock from [the] [Department] terminal was working properly [for] the time period."

Immediately after receiving the above from Paychex, the bookkeeper emailed the Superintendent late in the day on February 15th advising him of the vendor's verification. The bookkeeper asked the Superintendent to explain why the hours he had certified as true on his Detail Payroll Reports varied systematically from the hours recorded by Department employees using the Town time clock. She also asked him to specify for each Department employee, how many hours were claimed to be short, the dates on which those hours were allegedly worked, and to provide copies of any backup data he might have (including from a separate biometric time clock which the Superintendent maintains) establishing that those hours were worked.

On February 16th, the Highway Superintendent replied to the bookkeeper. However, instead of providing the requested backup to verify the hours allegedly worked by your members on January 28th, the Superintendent stated:

"Well the biometric clock doesn't lie, so you have the printouts with the callouts on the sheets submitted. You can deal with the union. the payroll I certified is true, signed and certified."

(Emphasis added.) This implies that the Highway Superintendent's biometric clock verifies the hours he claims the employees worked on January 1st.

Unfortunately, it does not.

On the contrary, the punches for the one employee who did punch in and out (which were deleted by the Superintendent) demonstrate that the employee did not work 7.5 hours and supports an inference that the other employees may not have worked such hours.

Prior to the issuance of the next payroll, the Highway Superintendent began making factually false statements of a political nature on the official Town Highway Department Facebook page.

The Town is still awaiting the requested explanations, backup data, and corrected time sheets from the Highway Superintendent.

The Town understands that it may be that the Superintendent and the Department employees lack such backup data. If so, the Town is open to employees claiming to have worked hours for which they were not paid (and for which they failed or refused to clock in as required using the Town time clock), submitting affidavits stating under penalty of perjury that they worked such hours. Of course, the Town would need to verify that such statements made after the fact may legally be substituted for contemporaneously created time records.

Under the New York State Constitution, the Town may not gratuitously disperse taxpayer dollars. Paying wages for hours not worked would be such an unconstitutional expenditure. Given the above variations and discrepancies, it is impossible to verify that the employees worked the hours claimed in the Superintendent's certified (and, in the cases of two employees, uncertified) Detail Payroll Reports.

Further, submitting false or fraudulent time punches and/or Detail Payroll Reports may constitute criminal conduct, including grand larceny, defrauding the government, and offering a false instrument for filing. Of course, the Town is not currently alleging such behavior. However, given the systematic variations and discrepancies in the Department's time punches and the Detail Payroll Reports for the January 28th to February 10th pay period, careful investigation is required to ensure that the Town does not spend taxpayer dollars unconstitutionally or illegally and to protect employees and the Superintendent from exposure to criminal liability.

I now want to address the factual context out of which this current issue seems to arise. First, as you know, under the CBA, the Town may, at its discretion, institute the use of a time clock. The Town and the Superintendent each, several years ago, installed separate time clocks. In December 2023 the Town understood that the Superintendent would require Department employees to use either time clock, but only one. Based in part on that understanding, on January 3, 2024, the Town Board passed a resolution requiring all Town employees to use the Town's Paychex time clock.

The TOB possesses the legal authority to require the Superintendent to use the TOB's official time clock. Specifically, the TOB Board is vested with "powers and duties relating to the town highway department personnel," and is given "general management and control of the finances of the town." 1989 Opns St Comp No. 89-34 (citing Myruski v Town Board of the Town of Goshen, 87 Misc 2d 1063, 386 NYS2d 984) (quoting Town Law §64[1]). As such, the TOB Board "is empowered to assign additional duties to the superintendent, not inconsistent with law, so long as these duties do not interfere with, diminish or impair the superintendent's statutory powers and duties." *Id.* (citing Town Law, §32; see, e.g., 1982 Opns St Comp No. 82-294, p 373). This may include "impos[ing] certain administrative duties in connection with maintaining work records of highway employees. *Id.; see also*, 24 Op.State Compt. 392, 1968^[1] ("[t]he town board may require, as an additional duty of the highway superintendent, that records be kept of the hours worked by each highway department officer or employee").

Despite the above, Highway employees appear to be the only Town employees who are not punching in and out for all hours worked using the official Town time clock. This includes call-in hours. Although the Superintendent appears to be refusing to require consistent usage of the TOB time clock, or to use it at all for call-in hours, doing so is a best practice. Moreover, as demonstrated by the punches deleted by the Superintendent on January 28th, all but two of the Highway employees reported to the Highway Garage on such date. As such, they were physically present and able to punch in using the Town time clock. Further, punching in during a call-in event is done by the employees of all other area highway departments, with minor exception. Moreover, clocking in and out on the official clock is the only way to ensure that wage

payments are constitutional expenditures and that employees and the Superintendent are not exposed to criminal liability.

The Town hopes that, going forward, Highway employees will use the official Town time clock for all hours, both regular and call-in. Using the clock consistently will help avoid the unnecessary turmoil and confusion caused by the refusal or failure to do so.
